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Highlights

- In the 3rd quarter of 2019, there were 12.5 thousand vacancies in the top 3 occupations associated with farms. This level is equal to the peak in the 2nd quarter of 2015.
- There were 8 thousand vacancies in the top 3 occupations associated with food manufacturing. This level is the highest 3rd quarter level since the start of the Job Vacancy and Wage Survey in 2015.
- Job vacancies in the occupations associated with farms and food manufacturing are more likely to be seasonal jobs, more likely to require lower levels of educational attainment and are more likely to require little experience.
- Enterprises with job vacancies in these occupations are more likely to be constantly recruiting to fulfill their job requirements.

Why look at job vacancies by occupation?

Farms and food manufacturing enterprises continue to have difficulty recruiting labour. In the short term, these businesses will experience lost production or the employees will experience the stress of overtime work. In the longer term, these businesses cannot expand to meet opportunities.

A companion **LMI Update**¹ reviewed the job vacancies² reported by farms and food manufacturing enterprises.

In this analysis, we review the shortages by occupations associated with farms and occupations associated with food manufacturing enterprises. Food manufacturing includes both primary and secondary food processing activities³. Occupations represent a way to understand the types of skills for which there are the most vacancies.

Number of job vacancies: Summary

Individuals employed within each industry sector are working in many different occupations. A discussion of the different occupations on farms and in food manufacturing enterprises is presented in Appendix A.

Given the considerations noted in Appendix A, we show here the number of job vacancies for occupations with a large number of workers on farms and in food manufacturing enterprises.

During the 3rd quarter of 2019 Statistics Canada's Job Vacancy and Wage Survey indicates 12.5 thousand job vacancies within three major farm-related occupations⁵ (Table⁶ 1). This level of vacancies is equal to the peak reported in the 2nd quarter of 2015.

Also, during the 3rd quarter of 2019, there were 8 thousand job vacancies within the 3 major occupations associated with food manufacturing. This is the highest level reported in the 3rd quarter since the start of the Job Vacancy and Wage Survey in 2015.

Job vacancies for a wide selection of occupations relating to agriculture and agri-food are shown in Table 2.

Number of job vacancies: **Trends:**


Three farm-related occupations

As noted above, the number of job vacancies for three farm-related occupations was 12.5 thousand vacancies in the 3rd quarter of 2019 (Figure 1). The number of vacancies has surpassed 10 thousand during the last seven quarters.

When the number of vacancies is compared to the level in the same quarter (i.e., the same "season") in the previous year, there has been a growth in vacancies (i.e. the bars are above zero in Figure 2) since the 3rd quarter of 2016.

Alternatively, a calculation of the average for the previous four quarters (i.e. an annual average calculated every quarter) again shows that the number vacancies has been increasing since the 3rd quarter of 2016 (Figure 3).



Number of job vacancies: Trends:

Three occupations related to food manufacturing


As noted above, the level of job vacancies for three occupations related to food manufacturing was 8 thousand in the 3rd quarter of 2019 (Figure 4). The number of vacancies has been above 6 thousand for the last 10 quarters (i.e. since the 2nd quarter of 2017).

When the change in vacancies is compared in a given quarter to the same quarter in the previous year (i.e. comparing the vacancies in the same season), the number of vacancies for three occupations related to food manufacturing was increasing in the period from the 3rd quarter of 2016 to the 3rd quarter of 2018 (i.e. the bars show a positive change) (Figure 5). In the most recent four quarters, there have been small changes (both positive and negative).

A calculation of a four-quarter moving average (i.e. an average over the four seasons) again shows that the number of job vacancies in three occupations related to food manufacturing has been (generally) increasing since the 3rd quarter of 2016 (Figure 6).

The number of job vacancies¹ in three occupations related to food manufacturing was increased, marginally, in the 3rd quarter of 2019, Canada



Geographic pattern of job vacancies

In order to indicate the geographic pattern of job vacancies, we show two examples of the geographic spread of vacancies for agri-related occupations at the 3-digit level of NOCS.

One agriculture-related occupation is "harvesting, landscaping and natural resources labourers" (NOCS 8617) with 8.8 thousand vacancies in the 3rd guarter of 2019 (Table 3). Within this group, 2.7 thousand vacancies were in Ontario (30% of the Canadian total) and 1.2 thousand vacancies were in British Columbia. Among economic regions, there were more than 500 vacancies reported in the economic regions of Hamilton-Niagara, Ontario and Thompson-Okanagan, British Columbia. In Table 3, provinces and economic regions within provinces are ranked in terms of the number of vacancies in this occupation (specifically, the ranking is by the largest number of vacancies reported in any quarter). Provinces and economic regions that are not shown have a sample size too small to generate a reliable estimate.

Another agriculture-related occupation is "general agriculture, nursery and greenhouse workers" (NOCS 8438) with 9.1 thousand vacancies in the 3rd quarter of 2019 (Table 4). Ontario accounted for 3.9 thousand (43% of the total) and British Columbia had 2.7 thousand vacancies in this occupation (30% of the Canadian total). The Hamilton – Niagara Peninsula Economic Region in Ontario reported 1.4 thousand vacancies in the 3rd quarter of 2019.

Offered Wage for Vacant Jobs: **Summary**

In the 3rd guarter of 2019, the offered wage for a vacant job in three major farm-related occupations ranged from under \$14.00 per hour for harvesting labourers and \$15.05 per hour for general farm workers (Table 5).

These offered wages are similar to the offered wage for labourers in food processing occupations (\$15.15 per hour) and labourers in fish and seafood processing (\$13.30 per hour).

The offered wage for machine operators in food processing was somewhat higher (\$15.95 per hour).


Figure 9 For NOCS 8432 Nursery & Greenhouse Workers, the offered wage 1 for a vacant² job was \$14.65 in the 3rd quarter of 2019, Canada

In terms of the changes between the same quarters in subsequent years, there have been only small fluctuations in the period from the 1st quarter of 2017 to the 4th quarter of 2018. There was an increase of \$1.75 per hour when comparing the 1st quarter of 2018 to the 1st quarter of 2019 and a \$1.00 increase from the 2nd quarter of 2018 to the 2nd guarter of 2019 which, in turn, was followed by a relatively smaller increase in the 3rd guarter of 2019 (Figure 14).

Characteristics of vacancies for farm-related and food-related occupations.

Among farm-related occupations and occupations related to food processing, over two-thirds of the vacancies required fulltime workers (30 or more hours of work per week) (Figure 19 and Table 6). This is higher than the job vacancies for all occupations in Canada where relatively more vacancies were for parttime jobs (less than 30 hours per week).



However, vacancies for farm-related occupations are much more likely to be seasonal jobs. Since 2015, more than one-half of the vacancies for general farm workers have been for seasonal employment (Figure 20 and Table 7).

Among nursery and greenhouse workers, 40% to 60% (depending upon the quarter) of the vacancies are for seasonal jobs.

Most vacancies for harvesting labourers are for seasonal jobs (except in the winter months (e.g. 4th quarter of 2016 and 2017, the 1st and 2nd quarters of



Most vacancies (60% or more) for farm-related occupations have no minimum educational requirement (Figure 21 and Table 8).


Among occupations related to food manufacturing, 40% to 60% of the vacancies (depending upon the quarter) have no minimum educational requirements for candidates to fill these jobs.

Similarly, over 90% of the vacancies for farmrelated occupations had no requirements for a certificate or diploma (Figure 22 and Table 9).





In addition, most of vacancies for farm-related occupations and for food manufacturing occupations required little or no experience (less than one year of experience) (Figure 23 and Table 10).





To maintain their workforce, employers of farm-related occupations were more likely to be continuously recruiting, compared to enterprises with vacancies for other occupations (Figure 24 and Table 11).

Note that "constantly recruiting" is undertaken for about 20% of the vacancies for all occupations in the economy but "constantly recruiting" takes place for 20% to 60% of the

vacancies in farm-related occupations and in occupations related to food manufacturing.

For vacancies across all occupations in Canada, the most popular recruitment strategy used by employers is an online job board – used by about three-quarters of firms with job vacancies (Table 12). This recruitment strategy is equally likely (depending upon the season) among firms recruiting for farm-related occupations and for occupations related to food processing.

Table 12 shows the historical pattern for the three major farm-related occupations and the three major occupations associated with food manufacturing. Table 13 shows the data for the 2nd quarter of 2019 for a wide range of occupations associated with the agrifood sector.

The second most popular recruitment strategy used across the entire economy is personal contacts, referrals and informal networks – used by 60% to 66% of the employers, depending upon the quarter. Generally, this recruitment strategy is used at the same rate among employers of farm workers and food manufacturing workers (and for some occupations, this strategy is more likely used than in the economy overall).

The third most popular economy-wide strategy is a company website – used by 52% to 61% of firms with job vacancies. This strategy is less likely to be used by farm employers but (almost) equally likely to be used by food processing firms.

Relative to the average firm with job vacancies, farm employers and food manufacturing firms (as shown in Table 12) are:

- about equally likely to be recruiting via social media (depending upon the season);
- more likely to be recruiting by using a government employment centre or website; and
- more likely to be recruiting by using newspaper advertisements.

## **Summary**

The top 3 occupations associated with farms reported 12.5 thousand vacancies in the 3rd quarter of 2019. The number of job vacancies for the 3 occupations associated with farms has been consistently above 10 thousand vacancies since the 1st quarter of 2018.

Specifically, the level of vacancies for "general farm workers" (6.7 thousand) is higher than in any 3rd quarter since the beginning of the Job Vacancy and Wage Survey.

The top 3 occupations associated with food processing reported 8 thousand job vacancies in the 3rd quarter of 2019. The number of vacancies has surpassed 6 thousand for the last 10 quarters (since the 2nd quarter of 2017).

Job vacancies in the occupations associated with farms and food manufacturing are more likely to be seasonal jobs, more likely to require lower levels of educational attainment and are more likely to require little experience.

Enterprises with job vacancies in these occupations are more likely to be constantly recruiting to fulfill their job requirements.

## Appendix A: Overlap of employment by industry sector and employment by occupation

On Canadian farms¹⁰ in 2011, there were 322,110 individuals employed in 62 different occupations when only counting those occupations with more than 200 workers across Canada (Appendix Table A1). The occupation with the most workers was "managers in agriculture" which was mainly comprised of self-employed farmers, although some farms do employ paid managers on their staff. The next four largest occupations employed by farms were:

- 73,905 general farm workers (NOCS 8431);
- 11,870 nursery and greenhouse workers (NOCS 8432);
- 5,610 agricultural service contractors, farm supervisors and specialized livestock workers¹¹ (NOCS 8252); and
- 5,295 harvesting labourers ¹² (NOCS 8611) (Appendix Table A1).

Some of the individuals working in these occupations are employed by businesses that are not classified as "farms". For the four occupations above, the share of each occupation working on a farm is:

- 89% of general farm workers¹³;
- 79% of nursery and greenhouse workers¹⁴;
- 57% of agricultural service contractors, farm supervisors and specialized livestock workers¹⁵; and

This includes agricultural service contractors who own and operate their own businesses and provide agricultural services such as livestock and poultry breeding services, soil preparation services, crop planting services, crop spraying services, cultivating or harvesting services or other services under contract. This group also includes foremen/women who supervise the work of general farm workers and harvesting labourers. This group also includes specialized livestock workers carry out feeding, health and breeding programs on dairy, beef, sheep, poultry, hog and other livestock farms.

Similar to the situation regarding jobs within the farm sector, there is a wide range of occupations within food manufacturing enterprises. In 2011, the level of employment in food manufacturing was 216,145 and there were 71 different occupations with over 300 employees across Canada who were employed in food manufacturing (Appendix Table A2).

The four largest occupations were:

- 44,970 labourers in food, beverage and associated products processing (NOCS 9617);
- 21,850 process control & machine operators, food, beverage & associated products processing (NOCS 9461);
- 12,410 bakers (NOCS 6332); and
- 11,115 industrial butchers and meat cutters, poultry preparers and related workers (NOCS 9462) (Appendix Table A2).

Again, we find that there are many individuals who work in these occupations but who are employed in other sectors. For example, for the four occupations listed above, the percent of workers in each occupation who work for a manufacturing enterprise is:

- 74% of labourers in food, beverage and associated products processing ¹⁷;
- 71% of process control & machine operators, food, beverage & associated products processing 18;
- 30% of bakers¹⁹; and

90% of industrial butchers and meat cutters. poultry preparers and related workers (Appendix Table A2).

However, Statistics Canada's Job Vacancy and Wage Survey only publishes the job vacancies for all jobs in a given occupational group – they do not publish job vacancies for a given occupational group within a given industry sector²⁰.

Consequently, given the current availability of data, we discuss the level of job vacancies for all jobs in the given occupation without knowing whether the job vacancies for the given occupation relate specifically to farms or to food manufacturing enterprises.

In addition, the published tables do not show the number of payroll employees for each occupation and thus a job vacancy rate is not shown²¹.
