En résumé

Annexe A : Chevauchement de l'emploi selon le secteur industriel et de l'emploi selon la profession

Faits saillants

- Au cours du 3^e trimestre de 2019, on comptait 12 500 postes vacants parmi les trois principales professions liées à l'agriculture. Un tel niveau est égal au pic du 2^e trimestre de 2015.
- On comptait 8 000 postes vacants parmi les trois principales professions liées à la fabrication d'aliments. Ce niveau est le plus élevé du 3^e trimestre depuis le début de l'Enquête sur les postes vacants et les salaires (EPVS), en 2015.
- Les postes vacants parmi les professions liées à l'agriculture et à la fabrication d'aliments sont plus susceptibles d'être des emplois saisonniers et d'exiger des niveaux inférieurs de scolarité et peu d'expérience.
- Les entreprises qui ont des postes à pourvoir dans ces professions sont plus susceptibles d'être en recrutement constant pour combler leurs besoins.

Pourquoi s'intéresser aux postes vacants selon la profession?

Il demeure difficile pour les entreprises agricoles et les entreprises de fabrication d'aliments de recruter des travailleurs. À court terme, elles subiront des pertes de production ou leurs employés souffriront de stress causé par les heures supplémentaires. À long terme, elles ne pourront s'agrandir pour profiter des occasions du marché.

Le présent document accompagne la **mise à jour de l'information sur le marché du travail**¹ qui fait l'examen des postes vacants² déclarés par les entreprises agricoles et de fabrication d'aliments.

Il analyse les pénuries selon les professions liées à l'agriculture et à la fabrication d'aliments. La fabrication d'aliments comprend les activités de transformation des aliments primaire et secondaire³. L'analyse selon la profession est un moyen de comprendre les types de compétences exigées pour les emplois qui sont vacants en plus grand nombre.

Résumé¹ Les résultats de l'EPVS pour le 3^e trimestre de 2019 ont été publiés le 17 décembre 2019.⁴

Les personnes employées dans chaque secteur industriel occupent des emplois aussi nombreux que diversifiés. Figurent à l'annexe A des renseignements sur les divers emplois en agriculture et dans les entreprises de fabrication d'aliments.

En raison des considérations exposées à l'annexe A, on présente ici le nombre de postes vacants pour les emplois occupés par un grand nombre de travailleurs dans les entreprises agricoles et les entreprises de fabrication d'aliments.

Pour le 3^e trimestre de 2019, l'EPVS de Statistique Canada fait état de 12 500 postes vacants pour trois professions importantes liées à l'agriculture⁵ (tableau⁶ 1). Ce niveau est

égal au pic de postes vacants déclaré au 2^e trimestre de 2015.

En outre, au cours du 3^e trimestre de 2019, on dénombrait 8 000 postes vacants pour les trois principales professions liées à la fabrication d'aliments. Ce niveau de postes vacants est le premier en importance au 3^e trimestre depuis l'instauration de l'EPVS en 2015.

Le tableau 2 présente les postes vacants pour un grand nombre de professions liées au secteur agricole et agroalimentaire.


Tendances – Trois professions liées à l'agriculture

Comme il a été mentionné précédemment, le nombre de postes vacants pour trois professions liées à l'agriculture a été de 12 500 au 3^e trimestre de 2019 (figure 1). Le nombre de postes vacants a dépassé les 10 000 au cours des sept derniers trimestres.

Une comparaison entre le nombre de postes vacants et leur niveau au cours d'un même trimestre (c.-à-d. d'une même « saison ») de l'année précédente révèle une hausse du nombre de postes vacants (c.-à-d. que les barres sont supérieures à zéro dans la figure 2) depuis le 3^e trimestre de 2016.

Par ailleurs, le calcul de la moyenne des quatre trimestres précédents (c.-à-d. une moyenne annuelle calculée chaque trimestre) montre encore une fois que le nombre de postes vacants est à la hausse depuis le 3^e trimestre de 2016 (figure 3).


Tendances – Trois professions liées à la fabrication d'aliments

Comme il a été mentionné précédemment, le nombre de postes vacants pour trois professions liées à la fabrication d'aliments a atteint 8 000 au 3e trimestre de 2019 (figure 4). Le nombre de postes vacants a été supérieur à 6 000 au cours des 10 derniers trimestres (c.-à-d. depuis le 2^e trimestre de 2017).

Une comparaison entre la variation des postes vacants d'un trimestre donné et celle survenue au cours du même trimestre (c.-à-d. en comparant les postes vacants au cours de la même saison) de l'année précédente a révélé une hausse du nombre de postes vacants pour trois professions liées à la fabrication d'aliments du 3^e trimestre de 2016 au 3^e trimestre de 2018 (c.-à-d. que les barres montrent une variation positive) (figure 5). Au cours des quatre derniers trimestres, de légères variations (positives et négatives) ont été enregistrées.


Le calcul d'une moyenne mobile sur quatre trimestres (c.-à-d. une moyenne sur quatre saisons) montre une fois de plus que le nombre de postes vacants pour trois professions liées à la fabrication d'aliments a augmenté, de façon générale, depuis le 3^e trimestre de 2016 (figure 6).

The number of job vacancies¹ in three occupations related to food manufacturing was 8 thousand in the 3rd quarter of 2019, Canada





Situation géographique des postes vacants

Afin d'illustrer la situation géographique des postes vacants, la présente mise à jour donne deux exemples de la répartition géographique des postes vacants liés à des professions agricoles du niveau à trois chiffres de la Classification nationale des professions (CNP).

L'un de ces exemples est celui des « manœuvres à la récolte, en aménagement paysager et en ressources naturelles » (code 861 de la CNP⁷), profession où l'on dénombrait 8 800 postes vacants au 3e trimestre de 2019 (tableau 3). Dans ce groupe, 2 700 des postes vacants se trouvaient en Ontario (30 % du total canadien) et 1 200 en Colombie-Britannique. En ce qui a trait aux régions économiques, plus de 500 postes vacants ont été déclarés dans les régions de Hamilton-Niagara, en Ontario, et de Thompson-Okanagan, en Colombie-Britannique. Dans le tableau 3, les provinces et leurs régions économiques sont classées selon le nombre de postes vacants pour la profession donnée (plus précisément, elles sont classées selon le plus grand nombre de postes vacants déclarés tous trimestres confondus). L'échantillon pour les provinces et les régions économiques absentes du tableau était trop petit pour produire une estimation fiable.

Un autre exemple est celui du « Personnel en agriculture et en horticulture » (code 843 de la CNP⁸) pour lequel 9 100 emplois étaient

vacants au cours du 3e trimestre de 2019 (tableau 4). L'Ontario comptait 3 900 postes vacants (43 % du total) et la Colombie-Britannique en comptait 2 700 pour cette profession (30 % du total canadien). La région économique Hamilton-Péninsule du Niagara, en Ontario, a déclaré 1 400 postes vacants au cours du 3^e trimestre de 2019.



Parmi les professions liées à l'agriculture et à la transformation des aliments, plus des deux tiers des postes vacants nécessitaient des travailleurs à temps plein (30 heures ou plus de travail par semaine) (figure 19 et tableau 6), ce qui est plus élevé que pour toutes les professions au Canada, pour lesquelles un nombre relativement plus élevé de postes à doter étaient liés à des emplois à temps partiel (moins de 30 heures par semaine).


Toutefois, les postes vacants dans les professions liées à l'agriculture sont beaucoup plus susceptibles d'être saisonniers. Depuis 2015, plus de la moitié des postes vacants pour les ouvriers agricoles sont des emplois saisonniers (figure 20 et tableau 7).


Over 2/3 of farm and food-related job vacancies require full-time work (30+ hours per week), Canada

Majority of farm and food-related job vacancies have no minimum education requirement, Canada



90+% of farm and food-related job vacancies require no certificate / diploma, Canada





Over 2/3 of farm and food-related job vacancies require <1 year of experience, Canada





Pour ce qui est des postes vacants parmi toutes les professions au Canada, la stratégie de recrutement la plus populaire utilisée par les employeurs est l'affichage sur un guichet d'emploi en ligne, stratégie employée par environ trois quarts des entreprises ayant des postes à pourvoir (tableau 12). Elle est tout aussi susceptible d'être utilisée (selon la saison) parmi les entreprises qui recrutent pour pourvoir à des postes liés à l'agriculture et à la transformation des aliments.

Le tableau 12 présente la tendance historique en ce qui concerne les trois principales professions liées à l'agriculture et les trois principales professions liées à la fabrication d'aliments. Le tableau 13 présente les données du 2^e trimestre de 2019 pour une vaste gamme de professions liées au secteur agroalimentaire.

Une proportion de 60 à 66 % des employeurs ont recours aux relations personnelles, aux recommandations et aux réseaux informels comme stratégie de recrutement, stratégie qui vient au deuxième rang de celles les plus populaires dans toute l'économie, selon le trimestre. Les employeurs en agriculture et en fabrication d'aliments l'utilisent généralement dans la même proportion (ils sont même plus susceptibles de l'utiliser pour certaines professions que les employeurs de l'ensemble de l'économie).

La stratégie qui vient au troisième rang de celles les plus utilisées dans toute l'économie est le site Web de l'entreprise, stratégie employée par une proportion allant de 52 à 61 % des entreprises ayant des postes à pourvoir. Elle est cependant moins susceptible

d'être utilisée par les employeurs agricoles, mais (presque) aussi prisée par les entreprises de transformation des aliments.

Relativement à l'entreprise moyenne ayant des postes à dorer, les employeurs en agriculture et en fabrication d'aliments (tel que l'illustre le tableau 12) sont :

- à peu près également susceptibles de recruter en ayant recours aux médias sociaux (selon la saison);
- plus susceptibles de recruter en utilisant les centres d'emploi ou les sites Web du gouvernement;
- plus enclins à recruter au moyen d'annonces dans les journaux.

En résumé

Le nombre de postes vacants déclarés pour les trois principales professions liées à l'agriculture a été de l'ordre de 12 500 postes au 3^e trimestre de 2019. Le nombre de postes vacants pour les trois professions liées aux exploitations agricoles a été constamment supérieur à 10 000 postes vacants depuis le 1^{er} trimestre de 2018.

Plus précisément, le niveau de postes vacants des « ouvriers agricoles » (6 700) est plus élevé que celui de tout 3^e trimestre depuis le début de l'EPVS.

On a recensé 8 000 postes vacants pour les trois principales professions liées à la transformation des aliments au cours du 3^e trimestre de 2019. Le nombre de postes vacants a été supérieur à 6 000 au cours des 10 derniers trimestres (c.-à-d. depuis le 2^e trimestre de 2017).

Les postes vacants parmi les professions liées à l'agriculture et à la fabrication d'aliments sont plus susceptibles d'être des emplois saisonniers et d'exiger des niveaux inférieurs de scolarité et peu d'expérience.

Les entreprises qui ont des postes à pourvoir dans ces professions sont plus susceptibles d'être en recrutement constant pour combler leurs besoins.

Annexe A : Chevauchement de l'emploi selon le secteur industriel et de l'emploi selon la profession

Dans les fermes canadiennes¹⁰ en 2011, 322 110 personnes étaient employées dans 62 professions diverses, si on ne compte que les professions exercées par 200 travailleurs et plus partout au Canada (annexe tableau A1). La profession où l'on a dénombré le plus grand nombre de travailleurs a été celle des « gestionnaires en agriculture », profession composée surtout d'agriculteurs indépendants, quoique certaines fermes aient des gestionnaires rémunérés parmi les membres de leur personnel. Les quatre professions suivantes comptant le plus grand nombre de personnes travaillant dans les exploitations agricoles se déclinent comme suit :

- CNP 8431 – Ouvriers agricoles (73 905);
- CNP 8432 – Ouvriers de pépinières et de serres (11 870);
- CNP 8252 – Entrepreneurs de services agricoles, surveillants d'exploitations agricoles et ouvriers spécialisés dans l'élevage¹¹ (5 610);
- CNP 8611 – Mancœuvres à la récolte¹² (5 295) (annexe tableau A1).

Certains travailleurs de ces professions sont employés par des entreprises qui ne sont pas classées comme étant des « exploitations

- 57 % – Entrepreneurs de services agricoles, surveillants d'exploitations agricoles et ouvriers spécialisés dans l'élevage¹⁵;
- 94 % – Mancœuvres à la récolte¹⁶.

La situation des entreprises de fabrication d'aliments ressemble à celle des entreprises agricoles en ce qui concerne la vaste gamme de professions que l'on y trouve. En 2011, on dénombrait 216 145 emplois en fabrication d'aliments et 71 professions différentes comptant plus de 300 employés dans tout le Canada (annexe tableau A2).

Les quatre principales professions étaient les suivantes :

- CNP 9617 – Mancœuvres dans la transformation des aliments, des boissons et des produits connexes (44 970);
- CNP 9461 – Opérateurs de machines et de procédés industriels dans la transformation des aliments, des boissons et des produits connexes (21 850);
- CNP 6332 – Boulanger-pâtissiers (12 410);
- CNP 9462 – Bouchers industriels, dépeceurs-découpeurs de viande,

d'élevage de troupeaux laitiers, de bovins, d'ovins, de volaille, de chevaux, de porcins et autres.

préparateurs de volaille et personnel assimilé (11 115) (annexe tableau A2).

Encore une fois ici, on constate qu'un bon nombre de personnes exerçant ces professions sont employées dans d'autres secteurs. Par exemple, pour les quatre professions susmentionnées, les pourcentages de travailleurs dans les entreprises de fabrication se déclinent comme suit :

- 74 % – Manceuvres dans la transformation des aliments, des boissons et des produits connexes¹⁷;
- 71 % – Opérateurs de machines et de procédés industriels dans la transformation des aliments, des boissons et des produits connexes¹⁸;
- 30 % – Boulangers-pâtissiers¹⁹;
- 90 % – Bouchers industriels, dépeceurs-découpeurs de viande, préparateurs de volaille et personnel assimilé (annexe tableau A2).

Pour l'EPVS toutefois, Statistique Canada ne publie que les postes vacants pour les emplois d'un groupe de professions donné, non pour un groupe de professions à l'intérieur d'un secteur industriel précis²⁰.

Par conséquent, compte tenu des données publiées, on ne peut présenter ici que le niveau de postes vacants pour tous les emplois d'une profession donnée, sans savoir si les postes vacants relatifs à cette profession sont liés précisément aux exploitations agricoles ou aux entreprises de fabrication d'aliments.

De plus, les tableaux publiés n'indiquent pas le nombre d'employés salariés pour chaque profession ni, par conséquent, un taux de postes vacants²¹.
